Host Homes: Opening Your Home and Heart

A new residential option is coming to HDC, one in which people open their homes and hearts to offer participants an opportunity to live in a supportive, family setting where they can gain independence and form strong, lasting friendships.

Host Homes have been around for a long time but are relatively new in this area. People who decide to be a Host Home provider have many different reasons for making that decision. They may be "empty nesters", families with children, single people, or anyone who enjoys helping others.

Providers and individuals who experience intellectual and/or developmental disabilities are carefully matched. Host Home arrangements provide a private home experience for individuals while also offering support and companionship. In return, the home providers enjoy making a difference in another person's life, while receiving a generous tax-free monthly stipend.

People cannot get enough of these fun-inthe-sun activities, except there is just one problem. Not everyone at HDC can participate in all of them.

On a recent afternoon, a group planned to throw a Frisbee around in the back of the Hickory Grove Road building, but some people were not able to participate. Some folks could not navigate the uneven ground or get their wheelchairs through the grass, so everyone decided to do a different activity. Leaving friends on the sidelines was not an option.

Behind the Hickory Grove Road building is a wonderful open space that would be ideal for all kinds of outdoor activities, but it does not get used much. Unfortunately, anyone who uses a walker or wheelchair or has any unsteadiness cannot safely make their way.

To address this problem, a new multi-purpose court is going to be installed in that unused

A Quarterly Snapshot: Daily Discovery

Just one year ago, everything changed for HDC's day programs, yet most things stayed the same. For many years, dayhabilitation (dayhab) services were provided in two separate buildings. The Brady Street location was Personal Independence Services, while the other dayhab program operated out of the Hickory Grove Road building. Last July, a big change happened to these two day services. They were combined under one umbrella and renamed "Daily Discovery" to more accurately reflect what is happening in the programs every day. While the program's name change was big, things largely remained the same for those who attend, enjoy, and appreciate these services.

In the past year, great efforts have been made to unify the two Daily Discovery program locations to ensure the best possible services are being provided. "When we started this process, the goals were to improve cooperation between the two campuses, share creativity, and provide more consistent programming—all done in an effort to make a great program even better," explained Katy Decker, Vice President of Daily Discover and Employment Services who oversees the program that serves nearly 250 participants.

Though the east and west campuses continue to have their own unique identities, group activities involving participants from both locations have taken place throughout the past year. Several holiday parties were made a little more special with folks from both buildings coming together to celebrate. Other events have included some spirited competition during a joint game day, a much wider group observing an autism awareness event, and a group trip to tour and lunch at the Special Kneads Bakery in Galva, IL.

Recently, participants also enjoyed each other's company at a summer picnic at West Lake that included a cookout, lawn games, and some fishing.

The joint parties, trips, activities, and events have helped unify the two locations, and some subtle changes in staffing have also helped. Two Daily Discovery casemanagers have a caseload of participants for whom they are responsible, as well as supervisory duties at both east and west campuses. In addition, there is just one person who handles inquiries and intakes of new participants to the Daily Discovery program. These small changes, in addition to joint meetings with staff at various levels, have helped to establish more unified expectations for the services.

Most importantly, participants have benefited from the Daily Discovery changes. "There have been 5 individuals who transitioned from the west campus to east campus, because their needs changed and they required a higher level of care. That transition was made much smoother, because we're all one program, just located in different buildings," said Decker.

With one year in the books for the new Daily Discovery format, the consensus is that everything that changed was positive and everything that stayed the same was made even better.

Performance objectives for Daily Discovery during the period April 1, 2023, to June 30, 2023:

Total number of persons served: **132** (East), **114** (West)

Number of intakes: **6**Percentage of participants attending full-time (East only): **96%**

Ranked on a 4-point scale, performance objectives were achieved at the following levels:

- Were made aware of options to access the community **3.8** (East) and **3.9** (West)

 - Were offered choice of activities 3.7 (East) and 3.8 (West)
 - Were satisfied with their community access **3.3** (East) and **3.9** (West)
 - Were overall satisfied with services **3.8** (East) and **3.8** (West)
