We have demonstrated Mission Moments in a variety of ways over the last 10 years, and we have even begun to share them every Monday in our staff Leadership meetings, as well as other areas of the organization. Sometimes we have produced videos that highlight a recent program, activity or individual. At other times, we have invited participants to a meeting to share in their successes. We can easily take for granted these moments that illustrate the organization's mission, so whenever possible, we try to find those moments of grace that define who we are and why we are here.

At our June Board meeting, one of our officers shared why he has chosen to serve the agency as a volunteer, as a donor, and as a cheerleader. He reminisced about the neighborhood where he grew up in the 1970s, a very wholesome slice of Americana right here in Davenport. His gang of friends rode their bikes every day and played baseball throughout the summer. In the colder months they tossed a football and went sledding when it snowed. But this neighborhood also had something unique. One of their crew was a young man named, Doug, who did most everything all the other kids did, but Doug also was someone who had both intellectual and physical challenges. The board member shared that he spent hours and hours with Doug, playing, watching TV, and talking about things that only neighborhood kids would understand. For him, Doug had no disabilities. He was just one of "the guys", normal in most every way, and they were the best of friends.

More than 50 years later this story was shared at a Board meeting with such genuine heart and clarity of purpose, that everyone in that meeting could clearly understand his reason for serving. And the best part of the story is that Doug is still a participant in several services here at Empowering Abilities, and even better is that they remain friends to this day.

Every person I have ever met who is involved with our organization has a unique reason for supporting what we do every day. For many of us, we have had family members who were born with special needs and may have received services. For others, they found a sense of purpose in being called to work in this field and have made it the capstone of their career. And for the luckiest of all, it is that connection to our childhood and

those golden summer days playing with our best friends – especially those named Doug.

With approximately 100 participants at each location and many staff to assist, there is never a shortage of ideas for interesting and engaging activities. From visiting mascots to visiting artists and from talent competitions to free throw contests, the range of activities matches the range of participants' interests.

Several additions to the grounds of the buildings have helped improve accessibility for everyone to further enjoy all these activities. Thanks to the generosity of many who helped with the funding of these projects, participants at both locations can enjoy multipurpose courts that accommodate anyone who wants to bounce a ball, shoot baskets, play pickleball, or even learn how to putt.

Activities are not always just fun and games though. Daily Discovery participants are also volunteering to help out in their community. They have sorted items at Tiffany's Treasures and delivered homemade dog treats and toys to Kings Harvest Pet Rescue Shelter.

Thanks in part to the generosity of donors who made gifts to this project, the courtyard at the heart of the Residential Center is set to undergo a significant transformation, marking the beginning of a new chapter for this communal space. The planned revamp promises to enhance the aesthetic appeal and improve the area's functionality, making it a vibrant and inclusive environment for all residents.

One of the most striking changes will be the introduction of new tile and turf flooring, designed to create a visually appealing, weather resistant, accessible surface that will meet the needs of the residents. The easy-to-care-for surface will also be a breeze to maintain, which will make the space usable for many years to come without the worry of deterioration.

The revamp also includes the installation of two covered eating areas, convenient wheelchairaccessible tables, engaging new sensory stations,

and an automatic door opener, all designed to ensure the residents, regardless of mobility, can comfortably and safely enjoy meals and activities outdoors. A storage shed will house equipment and supplies for recreational activities, ensuring they are well-organized and easily accessible.

Currently, the underutilized area is an uninviting environment that was always difficult to maintain, with a floor that was uneven and unsafe to navigate. The manual door and step leading to the courtyard made it impossible for residents to access it. By enhancing the courtyard, a pleasant outdoor space will be a welcome addition for residents to enjoy in their home.

As the renovation progresses, excitement is building among residents and staff alike. The transformed courtyard is set to become a favorite gathering space at the

Residential Center, offering a vibrant, inclusive, and engaging space for all to enjoy.

Paving the Way to a Better Solution

Now that summer is finally here, imagine this.... you're walking in the morning before it gets too hot; you're soaking up the sun's natural source of vitamin D; you're feeling good about your efforts, getting some exercise and reducing your stress.

Then, bam! You're jolted back with the honk of a horn. A car is trying to park and you're right in their path, because you're walking in a parking lot. In an effort to get out of the way, you slip on some loose gravel and barely save yourself from falling. An otherwise nice walk has just taken a turn. This scenario recently played out in the parking lot of our Hickory Grove Road building. The joy of walking that the participants were experiencing was suddenly overshadowed by an unsafe situation.

After this, some folks suggested walking in the grassy area behind the building, but that excluded people using wheelchairs or otherwise couldn't walk on the grass due to the uneven ground.

But the good news is there is an answer to this problem: "Paving the way to a better solution". Plans are underway to install a dedicated walking path that weaves through the open grass area in the back of the Hickory Grove Road building and it will be accessible to everyone. The multipurpose court and gazebo are available for all, and now this new path will provide another safe haven from the dangers of the parking lot and surfaces unable to be traversed by those who are unsteady or use wheelchairs.
